
board member, as we would love to hear your ideas.

# **Science Corner**

On April 18th NASA launched TESS – the Transiting Exoplanet Survey Satellite. The primary mission for TESS is to identify planets around stars in our galaxy. TESS can identify planets ranging in size from rocky Earth-size planets to Jupiter-size gas giants. The principal goal is to find small planets around big bright stars so that the planet's atmosphere can be characterized by follow up missions. TESS identifies the presence of a planet around a star by looking for the brief and minor dimming of a star that results from a planet passing between the star and Earth as it normally rotates around its host star.

TESS is expected to survey upwards of 200,000 stars and identify around 1,500 planets. Scientists estimate that of those about 500 will be Earth or super-Earth size (up to twice the diameter of Earth). TESS will divide the sky in many sectors and observe each for 27 days at a time. The telescope will be in a unique High Earth Orbit and will take 13.7 days to complete an orbit. The MIT Lincoln Laboratory is the developer of the most important parts on this telescope – the camera, including the lens and detector assemblies, lens hoods, and camera mounts. The telescope has four identical cameras for a total of 24 degree by 24 degree field of view. The image sensors, designed by MIT, are 16.8 Megapixel CCDs with low noise and low power capabilities. With this technology on board, the TESS observations are 30-100 times brighter

than those made by the Kepler telescope. The follow-up imaging will be done by the James Webb space telescope and other, ground-based telescopes.
