Our Appendix



My daughter recently had an emergency appendectomy so I was curious about the appendix. Our appendix has long been thought to be a vestigial organ meaning it has no function. Physicians now understand that our appendix functions as an important part of our immune system by helping to strengthen, support, and boost the immune system of adults. It has high concentrations of immune cells within its walls and functions as a lymphoid organ helping in the maturation of lymphocyte immune "B" cells that produce antibodies which attack invading viruses, bacteria, and toxins. Immunoglobulin A (IgA) produced in the appendix is an important mucosal antibody. The appendix is also a storehouse for beneficial bacteria that assist the gut to recover from infections and help prevent further infections.

Research has shown that people who have had their appendix removed are four times more likely to have a recurrence of a bacterial infection that causes abdominal pain, diarrhea, nausea and fever. To put things into context, appendectomies (the removal of the appendix due to some complication) occur at rates of 5-20% during one's lifetime and have resulted in ~26x higher survival rates than they were 50 years ago (input by Chris Rex,

https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC1422654/).

In the course of evolution, research has shown that the appendix has evolved at

least 30 times among different lineages. Even more interesting, once the appendix appeared, it was never lost. In a human fetus, the appendix starts to develop in the fifth week and is thought to help fetuses develop and it shows very rapid development early in life. During the eleventh week of fetal development, endocrine cells appear in the appendix and are responsible for producing hormones that assist with various biological control mechanisms. The appendix is at its longest in childhood and gradually diminishes in size throughout adulthood. A study has shown that a short appendix can be a colon cancer risk factor. Unfortunately, the appendix tends to become a liability in adulthood, sometimes resulting in massive inflammation (appendicitis) and its removal by a surgical operation due to lack of immune challenges, (input by Chris Rex,

https://www.sciencedaily.com/releases/2009/08/090820175901.htm). That, combined with the leading thoughts on "pro-biotics," is what lends many evolutionary biologists to believe that the appendix has a very limited, if any, relevant, positive, biological function in modern-day humans and, in fact, is more a liability than not, lending credence to the idea that it is a vestigial organ (input by Chris Rex).

A Time for Courage

Carl, the older brother of NASA astronaut, Ronald McNair, told the story of an incident from his brother's childhood. They grew up in segregated South Carolina. Ron dreamed of flying airplanes one day and wanted to read books on aeronautics and science.

In 1959 Ron walked to the Lake City Public Library, laid his chosen books on the counter and said, "I want to check out these books." The librarian refused to release them and told him, "We don't circulate books to Negroes." Ron jumped onto the counter and said he wasn't leaving without the books. The librarian called police and Ron's mother, Pearl. Ron told his mother it wasn't fair. Pearl assured the librarian her son would take good care of the books.

Hearing all sides, one of the two police officers said, "Ahh, just let the kid check out the books." Begrudgingly, the librarian gave in. A children's book was written about this incident that erroneously gave the librarian the credit for advocating for Ron. I wish the children's book would have relayed the truth, that a police officer came to Ron's aid. The police officer recognized it was a time for courage, a time to do what was right.

Embracing humanist values, I hope our world can attain social justice and opportunity for all. It is a time for each of us to be courageous and advocate for those who don't have the power to advocate for themselves.
