

Recent Changes to Women's Rights: The Good, The Bad, and The Ugly

"A Mixed Year for Women" was the title of an op-ed piece in a recent issue of "The Nation" magazine. Here are some of the gains.

- 1. Voters repealed Iceland's constitutional ban on abortion and legalized the procedure for the first 12 weeks of pregnancy.
- 2. Chile legalized abortion for rape victims and in situations where the fetus has a fatal condition or the woman's life is in danger.
- 3. Iceland was deemed the most equal country in the world for women by the World Economic Forum.
- 4. Iceland just passed the first law requiring employers to prove that they're paying men and women equally.

- 5. Women and men have equal legal rights in the workplace in only six countries. Ten years ago there were none.
- 6. In India the Supreme Court decriminalized homosexuality and ruled that sex with child brides is rape.
- 7. Lebanon, Morocco, and Jordan repealed laws that absolved rapists who married their victims (input by Chris Rex: this is great progress, as marrying rape victims is an act condoned by the Christian Bible).



Rattlesnake Venom Variability



After undergoing minimal edits, I successfully published the first paper from my Master's thesis in a peer-reviewed journal on April 4, 2019. The title was, "Venom composition of adult Western Diamondback Rattlesnakes (*Crotalus atrox*) maintained under controlled diet and environmental conditions shows only minor changes." It was just one more nail in the coffin for this archaic notion that snake venom composition remains constant throughout the lifetime of a snake after birth/hatching. We now know, and readily accept, the idea that neonate/juvenile venoms of many (if not all) snake species are at least slightly different from adult venoms. Once considered an adult, however, most people consider minimal, if any, changes occurring within venom composition over the remaining lifetime of the snake. I performed this study to directly address that speculation and perhaps shed some light on changes in a snake's venom that may occur when adult specimens are captured from the wild and then reared in a captive environment for 8+ months with stable temperatures, humidity, light cycle, and adequate food/water.



We extracted venom from 16 Western Diamondback rattlesnakes four different times over that 8-month period and analyzed them using 10 different experimental procedures (summary table presented below). As expected, the venom composition within individual snakes remained more/less the same for most analyses, including 1-D SDS-PAGE (a type of gel electrophoresis, pictured above). This kind of analysis creates something of a venom "fingerprint" of up to 16 samples very quickly/easily, allowing us to identify differences between venom extractions and between individual snakes. Although not shown, there were minimal, if any, differences between different venom extractions within an individual snake, but many notable differences between all 16 snakes [labeled A-P above, after the MM (molecular marker) which serves as a reference for the kDa (kilodalton) weight of each venom compound].

For two enzyme assays (shown above, LAAO: L-amino acid oxidase, PDE:

phosphodiesterase), venom activities appeared to increase in activity over time. Of the ~24 different venom proteins in Western Diamondback venom, LAAOs and PDEs are not particularly toxic to mice. Thinking about this from a functional perspective, it is curious as to why these compounds, which are of little use in offense/defense, would change during captivity. Perhaps there is a feedback mechanism with certain aspects of the environment/diet and the regulation of the genes that control LAAO and PDE production. Alternatively, there might be steady ontogenetic changes over the course of adulthood or a supply/demand problem with producing those venom compounds in the wild (as a result of poor nutrition), resulting in their lower expression in the wild venom. It will take further studies to fully elucidate this venom mechanism in order to better understand the factors we need to consider when collecting venom samples for research (including finding anticancer drugs) or antivenom production (which often relies on venom from captive snakes).
